

## Holocaust Book Discussion: Becoming Janet: Finding Myself in the Holocaust

As a four-year-old in Poland, Gustawa Singer lived an idyllic life and the family prospered. Then, in 1939, everything changed: Hitler's army invaded Poland, and Gustawa's carefree childhood days were gone forever. Ultimately, the Nazis killed 2,000 of the 2,200 Jews in her small hometown. Gustawa's mother was transported to the death camp at Belzec, her father was assigned to forced labor, and Gustawa became separated from everyone she had ever known.

Amidst the Nazis' vile hatred and appalling savagery, a compassionate stranger spotted Gustawa and took her in and fed, clothed, and loved her at terrible risk to her own family. For Gustawa's protection, her name had to be changed several times. She survived the seemingly endless ordeal of the Holocaust and was eventually reunited with her father, who had never stopped searching for her. They emigrated to the United States.

Believing that the world must never forget the horrors unleashed by Hitler's regime, the woman who was now Janet Singer Applefield began a series of talks to middle- and high-school students, telling them the moving story of all she had endured, teaching them the power of courage and resilience in the face of bigotry and hate, and encouraging them to stand up to every kind of discrimination and injustice.

# Nazi Civil Religion during the 3rd Reich: Secular Religiosity and Violence in Hitler's Germany - Michael Booker, Ph.d.

The rise of the Nazi Empire cannot be understood simply as a reaction to the socio-cultural and economic dislocations of interwar Germany. Nazism was a messianic civil religious movement, which offered Germanic "Aryans" the promise of a new life in a transfigured world. Dr. Booker will demonstrate that Nazism was essentially a totalitarian civil religion and that Hitlerian totalitarianism at its height undoubtedly had many of the functions of traditional religions. It will also describe how messianic totalitarianism, like that of the Third Reich, can lead to episodes of violence, mass slaughter and ultimately, genocide.

Joan Clinefelter has served as a professor of Modern European History in the University of Northern Colorado's History Department since 1995. She earned her BA at Grinnell College, and the MA and PhD at Indiana University. She is the author of one book and many articles, most recently "The Patriarchy Is Finished: Broadcasting Women's Emancipation on RIAS Berlin" published in Oxford University's German History in December, 2024.



### **Janet Singer Applefield Biography**

anet Applefield holds a Master of Social Work from Boston University. Working with the non-profit, Facing History and Ourselves, and the Massachusetts Cultural Council, she speaks to 4,000 students a year about her experiences as a child hidden during the Holocaust and the importance of standing up to bigotry and hate. Over the past 40 years, she has presented her story at hundreds of venues including the Massachusetts State House, Faneuil Hall in Boston, Harvard University, Vanderbilt University, Westminster Synagogue in London, and the Galicia Jewish Museum in Krakow, Poland.



Her book, Becoming Janet: Finding Myself in the Holocaust (Cypress House, 2024) is a richly illustrated memoir that reads like a novel. It tells of her story:


As a four-year-old, Gustawa lived in a bustling town in the foothills of Poland's Tatra Mountains.

Her father worked in the Singer's hardware store, and the family prospered. All of that was shattered on the morning of September 1,

1939, with the invasion of the German Army. After several failed attempts to flee danger, Gustawa's parents made the agonizing decision to give their only living child to a nanny. Assuming the identity of Krysia, a deceased Catholic girl her age, Gustawa is hidden in plain sight by a handful of strangers, keeping her secret that her looks conceal: she is Jewish.

Of the hundreds of Jewish children playing around the streets of her town before the war, she was the only child to return.

She has since then moved to the United States and raised her family and speaks all over the United States about her story and the evils of hate.
